REJECTED LOVER. ATTEMPTED SHOOTING. Sentence of 15 Years. 8Y1WF.V. Tnesriav.

Fifteen years' penal servitude was the sentence imposed . to-day by **Judge Curlewis** at the Quarter Sessions, in a case of attempted shooting.

Leslie Eugene Gospar (35), poultry farmer, was charged with having maliciously attempted to discharge a double barrelled gun at Alma Grace Forbes Smith, with intent to do grievous bodily harm, at Warriewood, near Brookvale, on June 12. There was an alternative count of common assault. Miss. Forbes Smith stated that the accused, whom she had known for some time, had proposed marriage to her, and had been refused. On the date in question he had followed her to her home, abusing and threatening her. That same evening she had gone into her bedroom, and saw the accused standing behind the door with a gun. She screamed and ran away, and he followed. She stood against the door, feeling paralyzed, and he raised the gun, which was a double-barreled shot gun, to the level of her eyes, .when her lather caught hold of his arms. The gun was fully loaded and cocked. The police stated that, when searched, the accused was found to have a razor in his pocket and also a bottle of strychnine. The accused made a rambling statement from the dock, in which he said that

he had borrowed the gun, but not with the intention of shooting any one. He was taking the razor to the barber to have it sharpened, and the Strychnine to the man who owned it. After a very short retirement the jury returned a verdict of guilty on the major charge, with which His Honor said he quite agreed. His Honor, addressing the prisoner, said, 'In my opinion you are very fortunate that you are not hero charged with murder. Crimes of violence are particularly common just now. You are liable to penal servitude for life. Had not the girl's father caught you in time you would have been here, on a charge of murder. I sentence you to 15 years* penal servitude

DISTRICT COURT.

(Before Judge Clancy and a jury of four.) VERDICT AGAINST COUNCIL.

Andrew Draskovich, of Warriewood Road, Warriewood, near Narrabeen, sought to recover from the Warringah Shire Council £400 for damage to his land and crops. Plaintiff alleged that in the heavy rains which fell on June 19, 1937, his market garden was flooded and his crop of tomatoes and peas damaged. There was also considerable soil erosion. He contended that the damage was due to the negligent construction by the defendant council of water tables on the Warriewood Road, of the catch drains above the road, and of the culverts passing under the road near his property. He further contended that they were inadequate for carrying off storm waters. The defendant council denied negligence, and pleaded contributory negligence by plaintiff in filling one of the drains with logs so as to give vehicle traffic access to his property. A verdict was given for plaintiff for £50. Mr J W Smyth (instructed by Mr J G Nicholas) appealed for plaintiff and Mr R Ashbmnei (instructed by Messrs Dawson Waldron Edwards, and Nicholls) for defendant council.

LIGHTNING FLASH. Men Struck at Warriewood. TREE SPLINTERED.

Three men were slightly injured by a flash of lightning, which struck a tree at Warriewood, near Mona Vale, on Friday. Mr. D. McLaren was clearing debris from his garden in Hill-street, and Mr. J. Skinner was watching him from a nearby house. Both men were almost blinded by a

vivid flash when lightning struck a tall gum tree about 70 yards from Mr. McLaren. Every bough except one was hurled from the tree by the force of the explosion, and pieces of bark were thrown hundreds of feet in all directions. One bough, 4ft in length, was tossed 100 yards, where it struck the chimney of a cottage. Windows in neighbouring houses were shattered. Mr. McLaren was able to reach a neighbour's house, where he collapsed. He was treated, and suffered no ill-effects.

James Savage and Hermann Schreiner were working at the switchboard of the Mona Vale post-office, when their instruments were struck by a blinding flash. The two men were stunned, and when they recovered were almost helpless for some time. Then they returned to duty, to find that a number of lines had been rendered useless by the disturbance.

A doctor who examined Jovanovich some hours after the fight said he could find no mark of any injury on his thigh where he said he had been hit. The inquest was adjourned until next Tuesday

ESCAPES FROM GAOL. MADE BY THREE MEN. One Later Recaptured. SYDNEY. December 17.

Three habitual criminals, John Williams, 27, John Bade, 37, and Joseph Bourke, 35, made a daring escape from Parramatta gaol early to-day. Eade

later was captured in a house at Killara- He offered no resistance. Police had seen him enter the house. Two constables, one a son of the Comptroller-General of Prisons (Mr. Hinchy), made the arrest. The men escaped by means of a rough ladder constructed secretly. On Friday at 10 p.m. they were locked in the bakehouse at the gaol. They apparently unearthed the rope ladder from a hiding place in the bakehouse. It consisted of roughly sewn flour bags attached to a long stick made of portions of handles of baker's shovels bolted securely together. At one end of the stick was a steel hook procured from the bakehouse. They broke out of the bakehouse, raised the hook by the stick at a spot near the main gate, and grappled the contraption on to a railing that runs around the top of the stone wall. Then they clambered over the wall. At dawn to-day the ladder was seen hanging on the wall. As soon as news was denoting an escape, hurried search of the gaol was made. Police in all suburbs were notified, and a wide quest was begun.

It was believed they were still wearing the white clothes of the bakehouse, but as a serge coat and dungarees were missed from the prison it is possible the escapees were able to change their attire. More than 60 police, coatless and perspiring in the boiling heat, scoured the waterways and lantana bush near Westmead, an adjacent suburb, after confusing reports had been received concerning the prisoners' whereabouts. Another search party had gone farther afield into Wentworthville. In scorching heat police beat their way through dense scrub, waded waist high through snake-infested undergrowth, and followed creeks and waterways through open country. All were armed. From several quarters news was brought of men in white clothes dodging and crawling through bushes. There were many false alarms. Police believe an accomplice outside the prison may be sheltering the remaining two men, and that a car may have been waiting in the vicinity for SYDNEY. December 17. Early this morning, one of the Parramatta gaol escapees was **seen by police at Narrabeen**. He fled to the bush and eluded squads of police who were rushed to the district and who, with police Alsatians, searched the area throughout the day. Two of the men entered a house in Llofeld on Saturday night and stole a quantity of clothes. The escaped men were employed in the prison bakery, preparing loaves for Saturday. Warders saw them in the bakehouse at night. They were regarded as 'trusties' by some members of the prison staff. It is believed the men have been making their flour bag ladder for some days, and it had been hidden under stacks of bagged flour until the opportunity to use it occurred. Police believe the two other men might have been with Eade when he attempted to cross to a house at Killarra when he was captured by the police and seeing him arrested, disappeared into the scrub. This belief is strengthened when a robbery was reported at Linfield between 6.30 and 7.30 on Saturday night. The house was broken into and a kit bag, blue serge suit, two grey suits and a dinner suit and hat stolen. At 5 o'clock this morning, police saw Bourke **approaching a house at Narrabeen**. He was carrying a leather kit bag and wearing a grey suit. Bourke saw the policemen at the same time as they saw him, and turning round, ran for cover in the scrub dropping the bag. A constable gave chase but Bourke had more than 100 yards start and

escaped . Large squads of police were rushed from the city, and Alsatian dogs were sent for. Twenty recruits from the police depot reinforced the numbers, and extra wireless cars and motor cycles patrolled the roads but no sign was found of Bourke.
