The causeway and stone jetty built by the trustees of Kuring-Gai Chase National Park in 1895 is the first for the public accessway in Lovett Bay. Built through being given permission to by the owner of Portion 17

Although Fairhaven opposite this point shows a quite substantial wharf and later, a larger version complete with shelter shed

The trustee, in relating the size of this causeway and its jetty, describes:

in 1900 a launch was purchased by the Chase Trust for use in Pittwater

Northern edge of the McCulloch land and northern end of Little Lovett Bay – is where current day 'Halls wharf' is

Halls Wharf – Northen end of Little Lovett Bay – alongside Towler's or Morning Bay

Arthur Wood (Portion 13 – today's Woody Point, Pittwater) – Towler's Bay - Certificate of Title Volume 931 Folio 231 – 40 acres – mortgage dated November 28 1890 to Percy Moore Wood of Ashfield by Arthur Wood (otherwise known as Arthur Branscombe Wood). Transferred to his wife Jane Wood on January 12th, 1895.

Sells to Charles Autry Hall on April 24th, 1913 - he had apparently been camping on the land prior to that.

Lots 1 to 23 they had sold to Robert Frederick Vaughan-Jones on August 26th 1949 (Vol-Fol 6079-158 – being part of the 40 acres – some of these are the Lots where homes have been built – and space retained on the edge and waterfront of Towler's Bay and the National Park. Some were taken – Lot 5, bought by Leslie Arnold Marriott has part taken by the Cumberland County Council on October 1st 1952 (Towler's Bay wharf site) – the remainder ends up, by March 1st 1976, as being held by joint tenants, by David and Margaret Haythornthwaite of 'Lovett Bay'.

Vol -Fol 6640-46 records Isabel Mary Baker of Coffs Harbour, wife of Arthur George Baker, Plantation Owner, buying 26 acres 8 ½ perches on March 13, 1953. History Corner

An early pioneer in Pittwater, Frederick Chave, developed three properties on points between Towlers and Lovett Bays with the evocative names of "Carlton Villa", "Brighton Villa" and "Bleak House" named after his favourite book by Charles Dickens which had been published in 1853.

Near the north entrance to Lovett Bay, Mr. Chave had the finest orchard in the district. One shilling (10 cents) bought a bucket of grapes grown from a "dingle" or area of hollow ground between his house and the road. He also grew figs, lemons, oranges and olives. When he died in 1898 Frederick Chave was buried in the little churchyard at Church Point. Other members of his family settled in Bayview.

It is most topical to point out that Salvation Creek which forms the title of the current bestseller and which runs into the end of Lovett Bay is now officially named Larmer's Creek. In 1939 the name was changed to honour one of the area's earliest surveyors, James Larmer. Interest these days also centres on Tarrangaua, the magnificent brick and stone former home of the writer Dorothea Mackellar (1885-1968), which was designed in 1924. This is now, fittingly, the residence of top-selling author, Susan Duncan, and her husband and so the literary link with Tarrangaua continues. A chamber opera commissioned by Warringah Council as a tribute to Dorothea Mackellar in 1988 included words which undoubtedly evoked the author's feelings about her beloved bay. "Dear Lovett Bay, so quiet and far from just about everything! The friendly rocks, the cool embrace of water."

At the Aboriginal Engraving Rock Platform within Lovetts Bay, which is accessible via the Elvina Bay Circuit walk, you can find rock carvings of an emu, large fish, and a whale. This rock platform is located on a sandstone area featuring a series of small cascades and views over Lovett Bay.

The Celestial Emu is a constellation that can be seen in Australia's southern skies from **April through to August/September**.

The rock carvings are quite famous and represent one of the biggest examples of petroglyphs in Australia. The CSIRO states this is an enormous site with many different types of engraving. As you come in from the main Elvina Track, the path forks into two, both of which lead to the engraving site.

The CSIRO webpage on Indigenous Astrology provides:

If you take the left-hand fork you will encounter a pair of wallabies engraved in a rock across the path, which, it is said, is a warning that you are approaching a male initiation site. If you take the right fork, then when you reach the main site, you will see a giant whale to your right, and an emu and the Baime/Daramulan creator spirit, together with his emu-wife, to your left. Walking down the sheet of rock, look for shields, wallabies, fish, eels, and other shapes that are not easily classified.

On your left, you will also see a line of rock a few centimetres wide, which is presumably natural, crossed by several lines, which appear to be man made. It has been suggested that this is a lunar calendar.

Notice too how the surface of the rock is pitted with thousands of tiny holes, or cupmarks. Are these man-made or natural? The answer is unclear. Consider the following factors:

- Such holes can be made by natural geological process (e.g. by a small pebble being moved by wind and rain). But go to the West of the site and you will see these cup-marks on steeply sloping surfaces, where no pebble could sit, and no pool of water could accumulate.
- In places (see photo below) there are arrangements of these holes in straight lines which are obviously man made.
- On the other hand, there are holes in places which merge imperceptibly into the obvious erosion patterns, and so are presumably natural.
- How could so many holes be man made? Consider this: Suppose, as part of the initiation ritual, each boy made one hole. If this site was in use for 5000 years, and each year a few dozen boys were initiated, then there would be about 200000 holes.

A man named William Oliver, about 74 years of age, a very old resident of Pittwater, died suddenly, about 8 o'clock last night at the North Shore Hotel, near Circular Quay. After having his tea, apparently in his usual state of health he retired to the hotel parlour, where he was seen sitting alone for some time. At about '10 o'clock 'Mr'. The application was only granted consent by Council on the basis of amendments overdrawn on the submitted plans which shortened the jetty length from 35 metres to 32.6 metres and realigned the proposed steps parallel to the length of the jetty, within a maximum jetty end width of two (2) metres, all in accordance with the normal requirements of Council's Pittwater Foreshore Development Policy. Current Modification Application The modification application shows a jetty length of 32.6 metres with steps transverse to the jetty end with an annotated width dimension of 3.75 metres, (but scaled width of four (4) metres) and essentially the same as the original plans submitted with the first application and granted development consent by Council, in an amended form. In support of the modification request, the applicant wrote "We are happy to accept Councils recommendation, with one exception. The steps as shown on the amended plan and consent do not give any access to the front of the jetty, making it impossible to board the ferry. There are two alternatives to using the ferry service, the first being the use of a small runabout commuter boat. My wife and I are in the Senior Citizen category and are well past using that type of boat. The second is the use as public wharves and this is absolutely out of the question in this case as Hall's wharf is about a 35 minute walk through a rough bush track and much too far for us to walk and carry our provisions. Lovett Bay wharf has no ready access from our direction. We feel ours is a special case and ask Council to agree with our request." The applicant had previously been advised by Council staff that under the Pittwater Foreshore Development Policy:_1. The age of the applicant and his wife was not a relevant consideration; 2. Private jetties are designed to accommodate private vessels, not the public ferry; 3. The adjoining structures granted consent in 1957, 1959 and 1967, ie. between 23 and 33 years ago, and prior to the introduction of Council's Pittwater Foreshore Development Policy. They no longer met the currently acceptable standards for waterfront structures. Assessment Development: In the vicinity includes jetties with 'L' ends, approved in 1957, 1959 and 1967. The Pittwater Foreshore Development Policy was drafted after these structures were approved, and specifically did not allow 'L' ends in view of the visual impact of such structures.

The Council has no tenure of this wharf by way of Permissive Occupancy from the Nationals Parks & Wildlife Service nor is the wharf included within Ordinance 35A. The wharf primarily services recreational boat users within k'u-ring-gai Chase National Park and serves no particular local resident or commuter requirements. In these circumstances it is suggested 'that the Council approach the National Parks & Wildlife Service with a view to accepting tenure and responsibility for the ongoing provision and maintenance of this wharf.

Coal & Candle Creek Wharf is within Warringah Shire at Illawong Bay. This wharf is a public wharf pursuant to Ordinance 35(A) but again no separate tenure agreement exists with the National Parks & Wildlife Service. The wharf was initially provided when a marina existed at Illawong Bay. This marina was demolished following the development of the Akuna Bay Marina complex. The wharf's sole function is to serve recreational boat users associated with the National Park. In these circumstances it is suggested that the Council enquire from the National Parks & Wildlife Service as to their willingness to accept tenure, provision and maintenance of these wharves.

Morning Bay Wharf - Towlers Bay. This wharf is a heritage item within the draft Warringah Shire LEP Heritage Items. The wharf apparently previously served the youth hostel at Towlers Bay but that commuter function is now served by Halls Wharf at Lovett Bay. No commuter service operates to this wharf. The wharf is in substantial need of repair and because of its location and construction, being a stone wharf would be very expensive. Further, Council is receiving reports involving the theft of dimension stone from this wharf, which because of its isolation and lack of use is difficult to police. The primary function of this wharf appears to be to now service recreation users associated with Ku-ring-gal Chase National Park and it is again suggested that this wharf be offered to the National Parks & Wildlife Service. In the event of the National Parks & Wildlife Service not accepting tenure and responsibility for the ongoing maintenance and provision of these wharves it is suggested that Council give consideration to closing and removing these wharves pursuant to Section 414(2) of the Local Government Act.

Joseph Cario – 40 acres and Andrew McCulloch again as 50 acres (?)

CARIO, Joseph Joseph Cario ("Portugee Joe") married Eliza Oliver in 1871. In a Statutory Declaration dated 30 April 1891 [LTO PA 10712], Thomas Oliver stated that McDonald's 30 acre grant at Salt Pans had been leased to Joseph Cario from 20 March 1878 for three years, where he lived with his wife in "a two-room humpy." Both Oliver and Cario had cut wood on the land. Oliver Brooks' wife Emma described the Carios' home as "a bark hut with a nice garden", on Salt Pan Point. Joe was sometimes known as "Portugee Joe". Emma Brooks stated that they had no children, but on 29 October 1880 Joseph Cario nominated a boy, Robert Joseph, aged 9, to attend the school which was being established at Church Point.[AO 5/17356]

Joseph Cario applied for 40 acres on the north side of Lovett's Bay under the Crown Lands Alienation Act of 1861. It was surveyed in November/December 1881, at which date improvements had been made to the value of £40, viz. clearing £4, cultivation £6, and house £30. A hut and garden are marked on the plan, close to the water. [LTO Map C435 2030] Cario paid £40, and received his grant by purchase on 16 July 1886. [LTO Vol.799 Fol.108] He sold his land grant in August 1886. Joseph Cario owned a vessel, the Maid of Australia, which traded between Pittwater and Sydney. Eliza Cario died in 1893, and her husband Joseph died at Parramatta in 1895.

James Shaw, residing at Towler's Bay, Pitt Water, was listed in the 1869-70 electoral roll; James Shaw and Joseph Shaw junior were listed in 1873-74. A Conditional Purchase of 40 acres of land at Towler's Bay by Joseph Shaw lapsed, and was taken up by Arthur Wood, being granted to him on 10 July 1889. [LTO Vol.931 Fol.231]

KURINGGAI CHASE. TO THE EDITOR OF THE HERALD.

Sir,-When on 6th October, 1892, I first submitted officially to the Minister for Lands the proposal to "dedicate the waters of Cowan Creek, and ... adjacent to same, as a national park for North Sydney, one of the principal arguments adduced was that "steps could be taken to prevent the reckless destruction of native flowers .eg, the rock-lily, formerly so abundant, is becoming scarcer every year, and must soon become extinct it not to some extent protected."

Two flowering seasons passed away before my suggestion was adopted by the preliminary notification of Kuringgai Chase in the Government Gazette of 20th June, 1894. During that interval of over 20 months wholesale depredations had been committed, not by the tourist but for trade purposes which left the foreshores for miles denuded of the special vegetation which had made them attractive in former years- the last tree ferns had been cut down, the rocklilies almost extirpated (the cutting of their flowers did no permanent harm, but almost every accessible plant had been torn away by the roots, and hundreds of Christmas bush trees of fifty growth and upwards had been felled, merely to lop off the top branches for decoration of the butchers shops &c.in Sydney). The removal of a few cartloads or boatloads of such vegetation each year would not have done any irremediable damage, but many of the depredators made a practice of camping on the creek for a week or two before Christmas and ruthlessly destroying everything they could find in accessible places, which they did not want for themselves, in order that others might not join in their harvest and cheapen the market against them at Christmas time. In 1895 a wharf was constructed at Lovett Bay with a walking track up the hill to Flagstaff Lookout, a popular picnic spot above Pittwater.

Returning to the northern side of the bay, at a point about 12chains from the end of the causeway, the party then descended by a zigzag path, which has been laid out to the summit of a hill which towers over the bay at a height of nearly 500ft, to a flagstaff, which is less than 800ft, on a base-line from the starting-point.

KURING-GAI CHASE. TO THE EDITOR OF THE HERALD.

Sir,-The trustees have had the opportunity of paying an interesting official visit of inspection to the Chase. Accepting the well-known hospitality of the Hon R.H.D. White, they left Farm Cove in his steam yacht the White Star on Friday at 5pm. The trustees present were -The Hon H Copeland (president), Dr J C Cox, Messrs. E Du Faur, J. de V. Lamb, the Hon R. H. D White, M L C, the Hon F A Wright, M L A, and the hon secretary (Mr E J Siervern. The remaining trustees-the Hon Sir Joseph Abbott, Messrs T A Dibbs and W J Lyne-were unavoidably prevented from attending but Messrs Edmund Barton and Robert McMillan accompanied as guests.

After camping on Friday evening at the Basin, Pittwater, they proceeded to Lovett's Bay (near Bay View), and inspected the works which have been carried out during the last year, under the Superintendence of Mr Du Faur. These consist of a substantial stone wharf, erected by consent of the owner of portion 17 and of the Lands Department, on the foreshore of portion 17, between high and low water marks, to deep water and a stone causeway, 8ft wide and 200ft long, from the wharf to the entrance of the Chase, which, owing to the shallowness of the upper part of the bay, was inaccessible without this concession from the adjoining freeholder. From the entrance to the Chase a path about 8ft wide has been cleared and formed through what was previously an impenetrable scrub to the head of the bay, where there is an abundance of fresh water crossing this, a similar path has been formed along the southern side of Lovett's Bay to a charming nook at the back of "The Peninsula," Mr Oatley's property. Here the water falls, except during such a dry season as the present, over cliffs about 80ft to 100ft high into a rock dell, where cabbage-tree palms and other vegetation luxuriate. These paths are about a mile in length.

Returning to the northern side of the bay, at a point about 12chains from the end of the causeway, the party then descended by a zigzag path, which has been laid out to the summit of a hill which towers over the bay at a height of nearly 500ft, to a flagstaff, which is less than S800ft, on a base-line from the starting-point.

Notwithstanding the difficulty of overcoming such a grade, and an absolutely perpendicular escarpment of over 100ft near the summit, the pathway is of gradual and comparatively easy ascent: it has been visited by many ladies, and from its summit a splendid view is obtained over Pittwater, Newport, and the ocean on one side, and the rugged features of the Chase on the other, a description of which must be left for another occasion. From the Flagstaff another path has been scrubbed for rather over a mile, to the Flat Rock; a peculiar formation, of which a graphic description has already appeared in the press. The trustees returned to the yacht by noon highly gratified with what they had seen, and expressing their astonishment at the amount of work done, and the facility of access afforded over so large a tract of country, previously inaccessible, at an expenditure including wharf and causeway of less then £200. Near the summit of the hill we come on a great cavern, or rather an archway, in the Hawkesbury sandstone. It is a wonderful spot indeed, for the architect or the builder has glorified the archway with the most weird and fantastic carving. It was carved by the wind. When the wild storms of wintry days swept over the Chase they took up grains of sand and tiny stones and flung the mat the bold peak till they wore a passage through it. The metallic oxides in the sandstone were obstinate, and stood firm, while the silicious particles beside them gave way, and so we get marvellous results in carving. This work, was painfully slow, but old Dame Nature is lavish in the use of time. It is nothing to her.

Just above the archway is the flagstaff, the point we have been climbing for, the point the pathway has been made to reach. The view from the summit is lovely in the extreme. Away in the distance over Flood's Peninsular was the blue sheen of Pittwater, and along the shores the little white nests in which human workers nestle o' nights. Beyond all, over a brief neck of bold, sandy looking land, is the great Pacific Ocean, restless, mysterious, awful! To our right and left are hills and valleys, trees, bush, gorges, and glory. For miles and miles in every direction spread, one of the most beautiful sights in New South Wales— a people's park, old, older than history, yet new and almost untrodden. Never a more perfect picture has been seen

in all this wide world than is to be seen from Flagstaff Hill, Kuring-gai Chase, Pittwater, on a clear fine day. Percy Cecil Chave Morrison was born at Bayview in 1893 and was a farm labourer. He enlisted in the Light Horse on 22 December 1914, but was discharged from service on 4 January 1915 for being overweight (15 stone). He re-enlisted on 6 January 1915 giving as next of kin his mother at 39 Smith Street, Manly. He embarked on 9 August 1915 and served with the 20th Battalion at Gallipoli. He was transferred to the 63rd Battalion. He was hospitalised with trench foot in November 1916 and with VD in April 1917. He was promoted to Corporal on 7 May 1917 and Sergeant in 1918. He was wounded in action on 19 July 1918 but remained at his post. He later fractured his kneecap. He returned to Australia on the Dunluce Castle.

Frederick Chave – born June 16 1831 to John (1774-1838) and Ann (NEE Williams 1791-183), at Windsor on the Hawkesbury. His brother George died at 6 months of age in 1833. His father died in 1838. In 1860 he marries Elizabeth Chapman at Maitland, NSW

In 1887 one of the Chave properties at Pittwater, opposite Scotland Island, is advertised for sale, having 700 Fruit Trees.

1898 On 12 May Frederick Chave purchases about 16 acres of the mid section of the Weller Grant (Portion 43) near Church Point. Frederick Chave's wife, Elizabeth, lives here for some years after her husband's death and has an orchard upon the land. Her daughter lives nearby with her husband Samuel Morrison, occupying the premises of the Pittwater Public School at Bayview.

Pittwater Involvements In 1884 the school in the chapel at Church Point became a Public School and Samuel Morrison was appointed as the school's third teacher. Morrison cemented his place in the community by marrying a local girl, Emma Chave, daughter of a prominent landholder and orchardist, Frederick Chave.

The Crown Lands Act of 1884 means people have to apply for leasing waterways for wharves, jetties, boatsheds, skids, baths and pay an annual rental based on how much/how many perches, they wish to use.

The Bell holding 808-161 – of 20 acres: they sell off two lots in 1917 then residue of 9 acres becomes Vol-Fol 2758-144 under Eliza Bell, R J Bell's wife, December 16 1913 of 9 acres 1 rood and 12 perches.

Dorthea Mackellar's first Lot is under the Lot sold by Eliza Bell to Henry Bartholomew Pickering of Balmain, Broker, on March 28, 1917 (Vol-Fol 2753-22). Isobel Dorothea Mackellar becomes the owner of 3 acres 3 roods and 15 ½ perches on June 12th, 1925. There was a William Pickering designing yachts in Australia – eg: ADVENT OF THE IOLANTHE

IOLANTHE was then produced, 38ft 6in overall, with a beam of 6ft 2in.She was a constant delight. Yachtsmen saw their way clearly before them. In 1895 the formula, L. x S.A. over 6,000, was Introduced, and James Coxhad Herreshoff built to the design of W. Pickering. Construction of this craft was an important step in Australian yacht designing. Herreshoff was a shallow-bodied craft, 33ft. 6in. L.W.L., with overhangs fore and aft. A bulb fin and a balanced rudder were other features of Herreshoff's departure from the orthodox lines. Herreshoff flattened the opposition, and in 1899 won the 100 guinea cup presented by the late Samuel Hordern, commodore of Royal Prince Alfred Yacht Club of New South Wales. The home, designed by architect Hardy Wilson after the (440sqm holding cost £1200) – actually acres, can only be reached by boat. It was Mackellar who named it Tarrangaua, Aboriginal for high rough hill. It was her longtime retreat, often arriving from her parents' home, Rosemont in Woollahra, in a chauffeur-driven yellow Rolls Royce at Church Point.

It was sold after her death in 1968 at age 82 for \$27,000 – the advertorial showing the land size was then down to just over one acre. Sold again in 2020 for approx.. \$6 million



Dorothea Mackellar had three brothers: Keith, Eric, and Malcolm. Keith Kinnaird Mackellar was an older brother to poet Dorothea Mackellar, and significant for being the only Australian soldier who was brought back to Australia of over one thousand men who lost their lives in the Boer War. Mackellar lost his life within a month, on 11 July 1900, a week before his twentieth birthday, when shot through the head with a Mauser bullet in a skirmish near Derdepoort in Pretoria. It is said the Boers lured Mackellar and his men to their farm by dressing in the khaki uniforms and helmets of the Australian Horse. When a burial party found Mackellar's body the next day, they discovered 36 empty cartridge cases. He was first placed at rest at the Wonderbloom farm near the site where he fell, and then in the military section of the cemetery in Pretoria.

His funeral service was conducted with a church parade at All Saints' Church Woollahra on 5 August 1900, with hymns accompanied by the Band of the Scottish Rifles.[10] There was a large congregation. His death was felt keenly by the Mackellar family and is said to have inspired Dorothea's first recorded poem 'When It Comes', written when she was 15.

According to Dorothea's private nurse and memoirist, she was unable to speak about her brother without emotion even in the last years of her life.[12]

The Boer War ended in 1902, and in 1905 Mackellar's family brought his body home to Australia at a cost of £1000. He was transported in a container marked 'Curios' so as to avoid contact with customs and any superstitious sailors who might find him.[13] Mackellar now rests in Waverley Cemetery in the Mackellar family plot under a white marble cross from South Africa. His family's act was significant in that of over one thousand Australian soldiers who lost their lives in this war he is the only one who was brought back to Australia. The death of Mr. Eric Buckland Mackellar took place at Darling Point, Sydney, on March 29. The late Mr. Mackellar was well known in the Gunnedah district for some years when he resided at Kurrem-bede. He was a fine horseman and a noted polo player. A son of the late Sir Charles and Lady Mackellar, deceased was a brother of the late Mr. Malcolm Mackellar, who was so highly esteemed in the district. Isobel Marion Dorothea Mackellar was born on 1 Jul 1885 in Rose Bay, Sydney, New South Wales, Australia, daughter of Sir Charles Kinnaird Mackellar (1844 - 1926) and Lady Marion (Buckland) Mackellar (~1850 - 1933).

After Dorothea's younger brothers died she was able to keep both of the family homes; Cintra, Darling Point, and a house at Lovett Bay on Pittwater. In 1968 Dorothea was made an Officer of the Order of the British Empire for her contribution to Australian Literature. She died in the Scottish Hospital, Paddington on 14 January 1968, after she had a terrible fall at home. Dorothea Mackellar's service was held at St Mark's Anglican Church, Darling Point. After she was cremated, Dorothea was laid to rest in Waverley Cemetery, in the family vault. Dorothea Mackellar never married, although she was engaged twice. After her death, her estate was valued for probate at over \$1,580,000.

Considering Dorotea is stated to have held on to her Pittwater place of peace until she passed away, a very poor treatment of a local. In February they recoieve another letter of support from the Warringah-ites.

Australian Women Novelists

—THERE is plenty of feminine journalistic talent in Australia but perhaps it is asking too much to expect them to enter the lists with less epheme ral writing!"

So Warren Graves concludes his article, "Women as Novelists" (W.M. 22/9/25). But surely the lists of fiction have been entered (and very capably, too) by nine or ten w ell-

known Australian women writers! The influence of women on Australian literature is a very powerful one. In fact, all the most notable Australian novels of the last five y ears have been written by women —

with the exception, perhaps, of Vance Palmer's Cronulla. By Australian novels I me an those

revealing essentially Australian atmosphere and true-to-

life characterisation. Many a book is dubbed "Australian" merely because its author happened to be a native of this country—

for example, Dale Collins and his Ordeal. The first woman novelist's name that co mes into my mind is Mary Marlowe Rosemary Rees writes simply and with the strictest attention to detail; so that her This woman's job is that of manager of the famous Iford Irish Wolf-hound Pack. She is here seen out exercising some of her charges at the kennels at Bromham, Bedfordshire. The Irish wolfhound, by the way, is one of the largest dogs in the world. Her stories never lack charm and are never overdrawn. Her latest novel is on the point of being published by Herbert Jenkins.

I do not propose to enlarge upon Miss M. L. Skinner's work, since her book, Black Swans, was reviewed fully in the Mirror on September 15. It is pleasing, however, to see this brilliant West Australian authoress turning to individual effort instead of collaborating with D. H. Lawrence, an author whose realism is not particularly adaptable to Australian life.

I am now left with the youngest of our women novelists, and one who does not usually go to the bush for the settings of her charming stories. I refer to Jean Curlewis, the daughter of Australia's most popular and well beloved children's writer, Ethel Turner. Jean Curlewis is one of the most natural and delightful of writers. Her tales, as a rule, are woven around Palm Beach and Pittwater (N.S.W.), and the characters, simply and gracefully drawn, are always infectiously youthful and charming. Jean Curlewis might well be termed The Younger Generation's Novelist; and yet book-lovers of more mature years can always read her stories of breathless adventures and love with unconcealed delight. And that, I think, is the supreme test of a young writer's literary worth. In her last novel, The Dawn Man, Jean Curlewis's writing has taken a more sophisticated note. That was inevitable, I suppose, but it is her earlier books, such as Beach Beyond and Drowning Maze, that have given me the most enjoyment. Of their class they are an achievement that any literary community might take pride in. In the matter of children's stories, Australia has been particularly fortunate. Ethel Turner (who has not read Seven Little Australians?), Lilian Turner, Mary Grant Bruce, Vera Dwyer and others, have done for us what the authoress of Little Women did for America. Australian mothers will always owe them a debt of gratitude. In conclusion, when one looks back over the field of the novel in Australia, one is impressed by the achievements of women writers, and appalled by the absence of their, masculine rivals. Apart from the publications of the N.S.W. Bookstall Company, the male influence in the Australian novel is almost negligible. The great Australian novel has not been written yet, but, examining the progress made so far, it seems more than likely that it will be a woman who first reaches that goal. Lilla Gormhuille Mckay

HEN people ask me if I am any

BUvU relation to the famous Jessie

McKay wrote to me recently,

L.— reply, 'No, but I wish I

were."

For many years I thought they were

sisters—which just shows you what a poor eye for details some people have, for the two poets spell their names quite differently. Lilia Gormhuille McKay is, however, a relation of Mrs. K. J. Mackay, who edits the Women's Page of the Christchurch (N.Z.) Press, and whose daughter, Mona Mackay, now Airs. Tracy, of Christchurch, is a writer of charming verse and an authority on Pacific and Maori history.

This important verse-woman has come her own way on steady feet, and has found a music in words distinctly fresh and original. Miss McKay uses a marv ellous variety of stanzas and there is the sound of bells in much of her work. She is ambitious, can see a large piece of work, hold it and sustain it, and bring it through in triumph. This, I think, she did in the poem of hers I like best, entitled "The Seven Towers."

I passed by the Seven Tozvers of Mabylon

In the tranquil morn,

Grey of the battlements rising high

Into the blue of the April sky,

A flight of doves like an arrow

sped

Merged in the white clouds over-

head,

Daffodils shone in the zvoods, dew-

sweet,

Where the Spring had lingered

with flowery feet;

And I prayed that never a wind of

woe

Might round the towers of Mabylon blow —

The Seven Towers.

There is a daring in that final falling away of the last line; and it is most effective in the final stanza.

One can hear the influence of the moderns rather than the ancients in Miss McKay's work, and, indeed, she tells me these poets have influenced her more than the old singers.

"If you ask me my favorite poet," she
wrote to me a short time ago, "Pd have to
hesitate. My liking embraces so many and
I like something of them all. Of the
moderns I love Patrick Chalmers, James
Elroy Fletcher, and the Americans Emily
Dickinson and Theodosia Garrison. William Morris fascinates me, and there are

moods when there is nobody but Browning."
Her favorite poem is Ralph Hodgson's
"Song of Honor." In prose her taste runs
to short stories, especially those of Jane
Barlow and Henry James.

Born at Howick, near Auckland (N.Z.),
Lilia Gormhuille McKay went as a baby
to live on Reay Station, near Gisborne, in
the Poverty Bay district. A few years
after her father's death, which occurred
when she was four years old, she went
to live in Auckland, where she was educated at various schools. She has a

brother, who is a journalist, but no sister,

I asked her if she always wrote, and she confessed that she began rhyming as a very small child, adding, "My mother used, at times, to criticise my efforts, initiating me in the mysteries of rhyme and feet."

From her mother, I think, she must have imbibed her love for poetry. "My mother loved poetry," she says. "She had a book of cuttings and I used to browse through it. Then our bookcase contained Byron, Scott and Campbell."

She has a good ear, and I think verse-'
making must have come naturally to her.
So many young writers are sent in a

wrong direction early in their careers by falling in with the bad-rhymester (who may be a great poet all the same) that Lilia Gormhuille McKay was singularly fortunate in having her first lessons in verse at the feet of those old poets, who attended to correct stanza and rhythm. One hardly thinks of Scott as a poet at all, but he is necessary in the complete education of every young poet. "I think I always wanted to write," says Miss McKay, "because, as a small child, I used to write a story every night." By the way, we have seen very little of her prose, yet her aspirations are towards prose rather than verse, and at present she is making a serious study of the short story, so —one knows not what the future will yet bring

There is a sureness in her work
at its best and she can be very
thorough. She seems to aim at
the presentation of a bright clear
picture, and though I have heard
it said that she never displays
much feeling, I am forced to
admit that there is feeling in her
work. Perhaps she restrains her-

forth.

self too much, but there is much to be admired in restraint in verse. She brings before the mind many vivid images, and often she runs blithely with the fays, who are not unreal but delightful and natural. I was much struck some time ago by her verse entitled "Zinnias," which was the forerunner of some charming flower-verses by various women writers. The zinnias, readers of the Bulletin may remember, were likened to the ladies of long ago; and there was all the dainty sentiment of Victorian days in the verse which ended: Upright and prim in a stately row, Like maidens of seventy years ago, The zinnias gravely ponder yon, O Nineteen Hundred and Twentytwo.

Her shorter Mirror verses, I
think, have been more intimate and
so more full of the genuine verse feeling
than many of her more ambitious poems,
but it is in the longer flights that she has
brought to us something of the still, cold
color of New Zealand that we Australians
hardly know. There are blue, icy peaks in

her work; there are clean, cold lakes and I have never found a snake in her poetry. Something of the great beauty of greenstone is in all her work. There is blackness, which one associates with a cold land, and there is the feeling of miles of blue flax, waving tussocks and, sometimes, a haunting Maori refrain. When one thinks of the strong color she has put into her poetry one does not think of delicate Australian tints in mauve and golden-brownone thinks of bolder tones, for these stand out in New Zealand as they do not in Australia, where colors merge and blend in a more indefinite way. In Lilia Gormhuille McKay's "verse one often ascends a mountain-top from the level of the sea and stands looking out over vales with a snowcapped peak above—and is grateful. It was against her family's wishes that Miss McKay took up teaching as a career. She soop discovered that her people were right and she was wrong, so she gave it up for office work, which was more congenial. "How did you come to write verse?" I asked her.

"Well, I wrote suddenly and quite unexpectedly, surprising nobody more than myself. and as my first effort was accepted by the Bulletin I kept on. Moreover, all my near connections scribble. I am the last to take seriously to journalism."

Coming to Sydney seven years ago for a three months' health trip, she has remained there—but is a staunch New Zealander.

She is naturally an outdoor and open-air person. Most of her verse deals with the open air, and one knows that she has loved Nature.

"Yes," she agrees, "I love all outdoor things—trees, seas in rough weather, dogs and birds and mountains, and my favorite pastime is launching. Add that I love the child-stories of my countrywoman, Katherine Mansfield, better than most others and you have me."

LOVETT, John The convict indent shows that John Lovett was a seaman who faced a court martial at Morne Bruce, Dominica on 11th and 13th March 1817, and received a sentence of 14 years. His native place was Waterford, Ireland. He was 30 years old, height 5ft 9½ inches, with a dark ruddy complexion, brown hair and hazel eyes. He sailed from Spithead England on the 3 April 1818 on the ship Isabella carrying 230 male convicts and arrived in Port Jackson on 14 September 1818. On the voyage from England, John Lovett and James Kelly were involved in a plan to take possession of the Isabella and considerable evidence against them was provided. [AO Reel 6006, 4/1740 p345-353] In Sydney Lovett and Kelly were both convicted on 31 October 1818 by the Governor and sent to Newcastle for three years per the Lady Nelson. [AO Reel 6006, 4/3499 p 123] On 15 June 1819 John Lovett was one of several prisoners sent to Sydney as witnesses in a case of murder. Major Morisset, the Commandant of Newcastle on 21 July 1819, appealed to the Colonial Secretary in Sydney: "I hope you will cause these men to be sent back, which will do away with the mischievous Idea, that Prisoners sent to Sydney as witnesses will not be obliged to return." [AO Reel 6067, 4/1807, p 45-6] It was reported in the Sydney Gazette of 17 July 1819 that J. Lovett lately from Newcastle had escaped. However, about this time, while still in Sydney, he was abducted with ten others by Captain Riggs of the American brig General Gates and taken on board. The General Gates sailed from Port Jackson for New Zealand on 29 July 1819. On 12 April 1820 His Majesty's transport ship Dromedary under Captain Skinner reclaimed the prisoners of the Crown and all were subsequently returned to Sydney. The General Gates returned to Port Jackson on 12 May 1820. The Supreme Court on 15 September 1820 gave a verdict of 12 penalties of £500 each against Captain Riggs of the General Gates. Eleven were for carrying away so many persons, and the twelfth for quitting the harbour without a proper clearance. [SG 16 September 1820] It was probably because of his co-operation in the General Gates affair, that

Lovett was recommended for a pardon on 15 December 1820. [AO Reel 6007 4/3502 p 26] By 8 September 1821, John Lovat (sic) Coxwain was receiving in Sydney 1½ rations from H.M. Magazines, under charge of Deputy Commissary General Weimyss. [AO Reel 6023 X820, p 35a] At a Convention of a Court of Criminal Jurisdiction held at Sydney on 25 February 1822 John Lovett, Overseer of the Sail Loft in the Government Dock Yard, was charged with stealing one bolt of canvas from H.M. Stores, the property of our Sovereign Lord the King. He was found guilty and sentenced to be transported to such place as His Excellency the Governor may direct for the term of seven years. In this crime his name was bracketed with that of William Wright, a mariner who had come free per the Almorah in 1817. In 1822 Wright was mate on one of the Colonial brigs. [AO Reel 6023 X820 p 35a]

Lovett and Wright were transported to Newcastle per the Elizabeth Henrietta on 20 March 1822. [AO Reel 6009 4/3505 p 43] On 10 June 1822 the Colonial Secretary's Office advised Major Morisset: "The Lady Nelson is now dispatched to Port Macquarie but she is to touch at Newcastle for the purpose of embarking John Lovett and William Wright who are to form part of the Crew of a Life Boat to be stationed at Port Macquarie." A further letter was sent on 27 June 1822, advising that the Sally was to touch at Newcastle for the before-mentioned purpose. "It was intended that these Men should have proceeded on the Lady Nelson, but it blew so hard from the Westward that she was unable to make Newcastle." [AO Reel 6009 4/3505 pp 393,395 and 439] John Rolland, the Commandant at Port Macquarie, wrote on 19th June 1824: "My dear [Ovens?] - I enclose a letter of Mr. Scotts which will show you that we have had a good deal of trouble here, though he is certainly very easily alarmed. On the occasion of the capture of the boat I was very much at a loss for men when two prisoners Lovat (sic) the Coxswain of my boat and Whitehead a constable over my Men volunteered to endeavour to take the runaways, which they did without assistance from the Military, and in consequence of their good conduct on that occasion I was enabled to take some other runaways and a number of sails saws &c. which had been stolen, and would have been the source of endless plans if they had remained in Plant. I trust the People will now be quiet for a time, but I have been under the necessity of taking pretty decisive measures to reduce them to obedience." [AO Reel 6068 4/1815 p 407-8]

John Lovett married Sarah Amelia Milford at St Thomas' Church in Port Macquarie in 1825. She was found guilty of stealing at the Middlesex Assizes on 18 February 1824 and at the age of 21 years was sentenced to death. However, this was commuted to life. She sailed from England on the Grenada and arrived in Port Jackson on 23 January 1825. Very soon after her arrival she was sent to Port Macquarie. Sarah and John had six children [BDM] during the period 1826 to 1840. However, it seems that only one of their children, Sarah, was likely to have been born at Pittwater, in 1834. John Lovett appears to be listed in the 1828 census as John Lovell, Port Macquarie. His 7 years at Port Macquarie would have expired in 1829, and his overall transportation sentence of 14 years would have expired in

1831. Sarah was advised on 17 April 1830 by the Colonial Secretary's Office, Sydney, that she had received her ticket of leave for good conduct. "Port Macquarie - Milford, Sarah, now Lovett, Grenada, in married state." [SG 20 April 1830]

The entry "Lovett, John, Pitt Water Sydney" appeared in the New South Wales Calendar and General Post Office Directory for 1834 and 1835. This reflects the position of late 1833 and indicates his presence in Pittwater around that date.

As Lovett's 14 year sentence only expired in 1831, he would not have been likely to receive a grant of land as early as 1833. He and his family therefore had to squat in a hut on Crown land, which was many years later granted to Joseph Cario, in what is now known as Lovett's Bay. As he lived on the water's edge it would have been necessary for Lovett to have been in possession of some kind of vessel. As he was a seaman it might be expected that he engaged in the Hawkesbury River trade but to date no reliable evidence of his taking part in this has been found. While living in the Pittwater area, Constable Lovett was involved in April 1837 in the recapture of bushrangers who had escaped from Goat Island. [see details under William Oliver Sydney Herald 17 April 1837] In July 1837 Constable John Lovett apprehended in Bathurst Street Sydney Dominic Kelty, who had been assigned to James Brown of Lane Cove, on suspicion that he was a runaway. Kelty, who was drunk at the time, stated that he was a free man. When he was brought to the watch house he made his escape but in his hurry he ran foul of the churchyard wall and was recaptured. Mr Brown was advised of Kelty's arrest. There was really little reason for Lovett to remain in Pittwater as he couldn't cultivate or improve the Crown land on which he squatted with his family. His employment prospects as a constable in Sydney were good and the move from the isolation of Pittwater would have been beneficial for his family. By 1839, apart from being a constable he was listed in the General Post Office Directory as a watchman living at Rock Court, Sussex Street Sydney. In November 1839 the First Police Magistrate, Colonel Wilson, was suspended from his office by Governor George Gipps, after a long investigation into Wilson's various misdemeanours. One of the charges against Wilson related to a constable named Lovett who was employed for two or three months superintending a party consisting of two of the Water Police and two assigned servants collecting shells for lime for the Colonel's new residence. It seems highly likely that this work was carried out in the Pittwater district because of Lovett's local knowledge of the area.

On Monday 27 July 1840 in the Sydney Herald a brutal assault on a constable was reported. "On Thursday evening, between nine and ten o'clock, as constable Lovett was conveying a drunkard named Peter Peate to the watch house, he turned on him and flung him on the ground with such violence as to dislocate his shoulder-blade and otherwise severely injure him. Peate was however secured by another constable, and on the following day was fined five pounds with costs." Another incident involving Constable Lovett, when he caught an absentee, was reported in the Sydney Herald of Tuesday 24 November 1840. "Yesterday John Valentine alias Anderson per Parmelia, assigned to Captain Hungerford of Maitland, was placed in

the dock of the convict side of the Police Court under the following circumstances:-On Friday morning, about 2 a.m., constable Lovett had occasion to take a person in custody, who subsequently knocked him down. Lovett got some assistance, and in passing along Sussex-street, recognized the prisoner as the person who had knocked him down. On inquiry it turned out that the prisoner had been absent since the 24th of February, 1837. It appeared that the prisoner when taken to Hyde Park barracks on Saturday last, stated that he came free to the colony by the Charles Eaton in 1834. The prisoner has been forwarded to Maitland to be dealt with." Around this time Lovett was still living at Rock Court in Sussex Street. John Lovett was working as a watchman at the Union Wharf, Sydney in November 1841. [Syd.Gaz Saturday 20 November 1841] Rather than following his original training as a seaman, Lovett apparently preferred the occupations of police constable and watchman. He continued as a watchman for the remainder of his working life. In May 1861 John Lovett died at his residence in Castlereagh-street North, Sydney, aged 73 years. His cause of death was given as "decay of nature". [SMH 29 May 1861] Sarah, his wife, died in January 1886 aged 81 years from "old age", at the residence of Michael Melly, her son-in-law, Abercrombie-street, Redfern. [SMH 13 January 1886] She was buried in the Devonshire Street Cemetery.

KURING-GAI CHASE.

The executive trustees of Kuring-gai Chase, with Mr. J. Garrard, chairman, made their periodical inspection of the Chase on Satur-

day.

At Pittwater the local progress committee waited upon them for some improvements in that section, such as shelter accommodation and water supply in connection with the magnificent view and track from the "Lookout" (500 feet) above Lovett's Bay. A large number of visitors are said to be attracted to the western side of Pittwater, and the view overlooking the broken indentations of Pittwater is said to be equal to anything in the way of marine views to be found in the world.

A request was also made for a track from Pittwater to the head of Coal and Candle creeks, Cowan. Further, that a landing jetty be placed for excursionists at Chinaman's Beach, on the western side of Pittwater. The trustees have the requests under consideration.

Several improvements have recently been made which will be found very convenient by visitors to the Chase. They include the erection of a new rustic shelter shed at Kuring-gai Point, in the Bobbin section, together with water supply. Some of the

commodious caves which are largely used by camping parties have been made more comfortable for occupation by levelling and cementing the floors, etc.

Between Umbrella and Peach Tree caves a dam has been put in to secure a water sup-ply, and a pipe line has been laid to the water's edge, so as to suit boating parties. The various properties of the Chase were in-spected, and generally found to be in good order. The picturesque surroundings of both Cowan and Pittwater were found to be most attractive, and there is a prospect of a large number of visitors in the present season. Kuring-gai Chase Trust.

No. II.

(By the Hon. Secretary.)

In my last article I promised a short resume of the trustees' object and aims, and a statement of the methods followed in the expenditure to date. For the information of those who may not have read my introductory remarks, I will repeat that the Chase was dedicated in the latter end of 1894, and a sum of £200 was credited on account in the Bank of New South Wales wherewith to com-mence operations. The greater portion of our 53,000 acres being a "terra incognita" to the ma-jority of the trustees, an early opportunity was taken of inspecting as much as was possible in a two days' tour, and a general plan of campaign was decided upon.

In order to make the proportion of expenditure understandable, it should be explained that na-ture has divided the Chase into eight distinct por-tions, no single portion being accessible by land directly from any other portion, i.e., the park consists of a series of ridges divided by ravines of a terribly rough nature, such as only an experienced bushman or mountaineer could cross. These several portions are approached by land from various centres of population, and commencing at the Hawkesbury Bridge, are respectively named: Berowra, in area 4000 acres; Cowan, in area 500 acres; Colah, in area 2600 acres; Wahroongah, in area 500 acres; Bobbin, in area 3000 acres; Cen-tral; Jersey, in area 500 acres; Pittwater. Berowra section is approached from Berowra Station, from which a steep, though well-made track, has been constructed by the Works De-partment to Windybank's well known boating es-tablishment on Cowan Creek. Colah section adjoins, and is approached from Colah or Hornsby Stations. The route from the latter is by a good coach drive along the Peat's Ferry-road, crossing the Great Northern Railway Line at a level crossing about one-third of a mile south of Colah Station, thence north-easterly along a formed road about four miles in length to the Gilrigong or Cowan Creek. The easiest walk-ing station is Colah, returning southerly along the railway line to the crossing above described, and thence to the water along the road recently form-ed, four and a half miles in all to the water's edge. Wahroongah section abuts upon what

is known as Wahroongah, and is approached along an at present indifferent track in a northerly direction from the railway station, passing the junction of Lover's Jump and Spring Creeks at a point distant about two and one-sixth miles from the railway station, and a road is now being cleared along the bank of the latter creek to Cowan; total distance, about five miles. Bobbin section is approached from Pymble or Turramurra Stations. From the former the Lane Cove-road is followed to the convent, thence

along the Bobbin End-road, the last two miles a capital driving road, the last three miles pre-sently being a bush track requiring same patching up. From Turramurra Station the Eastern-road is followed for three-quarters of a mile, where Biffin's-road turns off to the east, and junctions the Bobbin End-road a little this side of King's Orchard. Jersey section: Accessible from Gordon and neighboring stations; shortest distance to boundary of Chase from Gordon Station, viz., Stony Creek road, about 4½ miles. Central section: Situated between Pittwater section and West Head, but practically only ap-proachable by water at the present time. Pittwater section, though approachable by a 14-mile drive from Pymble along the Pittwater road past Tumble Down Dick, is really only ac-cessible from Manly via Narrabeen and Church point; and it is upon this section that the greatest expenditure has been incurred, as, through the agency of Mr. Dugald Thomson, M.L.A., a sum of £150 was obtained for expenditure in the portion of the park included in the Warringah electorate. As previously explained, the trustees having so large an area under control, it is a matter of extreme difficulty to so scatter expenditure that no portion of the reserve shall be thought to be neglected, and in this respect the principal difficulties are presented. Many little improvements suggest themselves at first blush which mature consideration proves would only mean the frittering away of small sums, which, unless backed up by further grants, must eventually prove useless; for instance, no good can come of clearing a camping ground if no road approach is made to such camp; and perhaps the dual expenditure is im-possible. Then, too, with the limited funds at our disposal, the opening up of paths to our fern gullies only cleans that the work of spoilation is rendered more easy, and we are loath to do this, until we can increase our patrolling force.

The present emolument paid to special constables is but £20 per annum, one of whom keeps an eye upon Pittwater section, and another Cowan, while our "honorary specials" have no defined location, and their visitations are irregular. It will be readily conceded that to prevent a to-tal disregard of our bylaws, with this small outlay we have, what the Yankees describe, "a tall or-der" in hand; but we hope to attain most, not by precept, but rather by the example of the right thinking portion of our visitors. The following concise reports set out the nature of work done, lengths of roads and pathways con-structed, and localities attempted to be im-proved: —

Pittwater: Forming stone causeway, 8ft wide, along foreshore, from entrance of chase to deep water, Lovett's Bay, 135 yards, and building substantial stone wharf at same. Scrubbing and forming pathway along foreshore from

causeway to head of Lovett's Bay, on north side, and continuing same on south side to boundary of Flood and Oatley's Estate, Ventnor. Scrubbing and forming zigzag pathway from above foreshore, north side, up to flag staff, 500ft high; ditto, paths to Flat Rocks; and many minor surveys and connections ditto ditto causeway, 6 chains 15 links; to head of Lovett's Bay, 45 chains 70 links; to Ventnor, 41 chains; Zigzag to Flagstaff, 40 chains; to Flat Rock, 37 chains 30 links; to or Flat Rock, 10 chains 15 links. ON THE LAND.

WILD FLOWERS.

' (BY W. M. SHERRIE)

The

wonderful wild flower country which is within easy reach of the city of Sydney, and especially north and south in the region of the coast, is being slowly but surely devastated.

At the present rate of destruction 'thousands of acres of land, which. In point of richness and variety of flora, constitutes one of the greatest of the landscape glories, of Australia, will be entirely denuded of its Interest and beauty. The multitudes of picnickers and week-enders go further and stir far afield with the extension of the tram- ways and other means of travel, and they mutilate and destroy on a wholesale scale. There is no reason why people should not have wild flowers; but there is every reason why they should be prevented from gathering them in a manner which means widespread extirpation.

Beyond Manly-indeed, all over that lovely region embracing Barrenjoey, Palm Beach, Pittwater, Ku-ring-gai Chase wild flowers grow in abundance and in great variety. Waratahs, flannel flowers, Christmas bells, and scores of other blooms flourish through many months of the year, but everywhere they are being gradually reduced, if not wholly destroyed. About Dee Why, Narrabeen, Brookvale, French's Forest, and thereabouts, as well as on the South Coast, the same process of devastation goes on year after year with cumulative effect, and no attempt appears to have been made to restrain the desolating hands of the raiders. It only people picked flowers for the love of them, or confined themselves to taking reasonable quantities, there would be no objection to them taking toll of the riot of floral beauty SO generously provided by nature. The majority of people waste and destroy far more flowers than they need. A common practice is to tear whole plants up by the root. If they would only cut or break off the stalks and leave the root in the ground the plants would continue to grow and to bear blooms. As it is they are killed outright.

Australia's national flower, the gorgeous waratah. is not torn up by the root, simply because nature has given it a means of protection against that sort of ruthlessness. But the bushes are seriously mutilated. About Palm Beach one sees many waratahs which bear no Cowers, and probably will never do so again. Apparently this sterility

is due to the violent treatment they have received by thoughtless or wanton visitors. People cross over to Ku-ring-gai Chase and come back with as many waratahs as they can carry. Hundreds of these blooms are wasted. People greedily possess themselves of far more than they have any use for, and, becoming tired of their loads, leave them lying on the ground. Following in the wake of a holiday crowd one sees torn and mangled plants and blooms of every description. People who oc-have In this way cannot really claim to be considered lovers of either nature or of beauty In any form. Numbers of them pick lovely flowers only to throw them away. In much the same spirit which animates a young child having no knowledge of right or wrong. For the most [part private lands and public reserves are raided without discrimination or respect for the rights of the individual or the community. The wild flowers of the coastal districts about Sydney are an everlasting source of charm and delight to tens of thousands of people. They Fire also a source of health and physical pleasures, since they serve the useful purpose of attracting denizens of the metropolis into the bush to spend their holidays and their week-ends. Thus wild flowers minister to the material as well as the romantic needs of the people, and as the collective property of the community they should be afforded some measure of protection. Objections to Extensive Oyster Leases

Recently the Fisheries Board decided to lease 10,000 yards of foreshore In Pittwater to an enterprising man for oyster fattening body. The area was not continuous, but scattered round Pittwater, Bayview, Newport, Careel Bay, The Basin, and Saltpan Point. Several objections were, however, received to the leasing, residents having water frontages urging that there would be depreciation of their property, interference with their water approach, and deprivation of net-fishermen by taking away their hauling grounds. They, also pointed out that unsightly stakes and stones would be laid on the losses in connection with oyster culture, and that the sewage from houses round this arm of Broken Bay would make the oysters dangerous food.

Mr. F. Farnell (chairman of the board) and Mr. J. A. Brodie (chief inspector) paid a visit to the place a few days ago to investigate the validity of the objections, and reported that none of the objections was tenable. Provision had been made for boat access to properties abutting on the lease, the hauling grounds were not to be leased, the Navigation Department had no objection to the erection of ballast walls to protect the oyster banks at Careel Bay and Saltpan Point so long as they did not extend further out than low water mark, and there was no danger of the oysters becoming affected by sewage.

With this report before It the board decided to grant the majority of the leases, but set apart Towler's and Lovett's Rays and other parts used by the public for public oyster reserves. Sir,-Referring to an item of news in your columns, headed "Manly to Bayview," in which it Is stated that the Mayor of Manly gave his casting vote against the proposal of an opposition company to put extra coaches on this most popular run, surely such an act denotes lack of enterprise on the part of the Mayor and a few of the aldermen of Manly. It Is conceded by those who are qualified to give an opinion that Bayview and the beautiful surroundings of Pittwater must continue to 'remain a sealed book" so far as the general public is concerned until better and more 'frequent communication is established. The coach service to-day is the same as it was 10 years ago, sluggish and expensive, and unless the Government comes to the rescue no improvement is possible. If a single concern is allowed to have control of the road under present conditions the coaches will be run to suit those interested, and not the public.

Monopolies do no good for the people. I am of opinion that the Transit Commissioners should consider the interests of the general public, who are clamouring for a better service to Bayview. The old standing complaint of the residents of Pittwater is the want of a later coach from Manly on week days than 4.15 p.m., and one to leave Church Point at about 5 p.m. The proposed now company intended, I believe, to fill the gap by providing coaches about the time stated. Then, what reason could the Mayor have for voting against such a proposal?

I am a supporter of the coaches both in winter and summer, and, with many others, would like to see a change In the time-table to suit present requirements. The one in existence was all right 10 years ago.

KURINGGAI CHASE. TO THE EDITOR OF THE HERALD.

Sir,-When on 6th October, 1892, I first submitted officially to the Minister for Lands the proposal to "dedicate the waters of Cowan Creek, and

mils adjacent to same, as a national park for North Sydney, one of the principal arguments adduced was that "steps could be taken to prevent the reckless destruction of native flowers .eg, the rock-lily, formerly so abundant, is becoming scarcer every year, and must soon become extinct it not to some extent protected "

Two flowering seasons passed away before my suggestion was adopted by the preliminary notification of Kuringgai Chase in the Government Gazette of 20th June, 1894. During that interval of over 20 months wholesale depredations had been committed, not by the tourist but for trade purposes which left the foreshores for miles denuded of the special vegetation which had made them attractive in former years- the last tree ferus had been cut down, the rocklilies almost extirpated (the cutting of their flowers did no permanent harm, but almost every accessible plant had been torn away by the roots, and hundreds of Christmas bush trees of fifty growth and upwards had been felled, merely to lop off the top branches for decoration of the butchers shops &c.in Sydney. The removal of a few cartloads or boatloads of such vegetation each year would not have done any irremediable damage, but many of the depredators made a practice of camping on the creek for a week or two before Christmas and ruthlessly destroying everything they could find in accessible places, which they did not want for themselves, in order that others might not join in their harvest and cheapen the market against them at Christmas time.

After camping on Friday evening at the Basin, Pittwater, they proceeded to Lovett's Bay (near Bay View), and inspected the works which have been carried out during the last year, under the Superintendence of Mr Du Faur. These consist of a substantial stone wharf, erected by consent of the owner of portion 17 and of the Lands Department, on the foreshore of portion 17, between high and low water marks, to deep water and a stone causeway, 8ft wide and 200ft long, from the wharf to the entrance of the Chase, which, owing to the shallowness of tho upper part of the bay, was inaccessible without this concession from the adjoining freeholder. From the entrance to the Chase a path about 8ft wide has been cleared and formed through what was previously an impenetrable scrub to the head of the bay, where there is an abundance of fresh water crossing this, a similar path has been formed along the southern side of Lovett's Bay to a charming nook at the back of "The Peninsula," Mr Oatley's property. Here the water falls, except during such a dry season as the present, over cliffs about 80ft to 100ft high into a rock dell, where cabbage-tree palms and other vegetation luxuriate. These paths are about a mile in length.

Returning to the northern side of the bay, at a point about 12chains from the end of the causeway, the party then descended by a zigzag path, which has been laid out to the summit of a hill which towers over the bay at a height of nearly 500ft, to a flagstaff, which is less than S800ft, on a base-line from the starting-point.

Notwithstanding the difficulty of overcoming such a grade, and an absolutely perpendicular escarpment of over 100ft near the summit, the pathway is of gradual and comparatively easy ascent: it has been visited by many ladies, and from its summit a splendid view is obtained over Pittwater, Newport, and the ocean on one side, and the rugged features of the Chase on the other, a description of which must

be left for another occasion. From the Flagstaff another path has been scrubbed for rather over a mile, to the Flat Rock; a peculiar formation, of which a graphic description has already appeared m the press. The trustees returned to the yacht by noon highly gratified with what they had seen, and expressing their astonishment at the amount of work done, and the facility of access afforded over so large a tract of country, previously inaccessible, at an expenditure including wharf and causeway of less then £200.

A remnant of this causeway is now a retaining wall at Lovett Bay and Heritage listed by Pittwater Council. The trustees, working with local folk, continued to make the walk up to this splendid view more comfortable for trekkers:

KURING-GAI CHASE. The executive trustees of Kuring-gai Chase, with Mr. J. Garrard, chairman, made their periodical inspection of the Chase on Saturday. At Pittwater the local progress committee waited upon them for some improvements in that section, such as shelter accommodation and water supply in connection with the magnificent view and track from the "Lookout" (500 feet) above Lovett's Bay. A large number of visitors are said to be attracted to the western side of Pittwater, and the view overlooking the broken indentations of Pittwater is said to be equal to anything in the way of marine views to be found in the world. Memories - Elizabeth Franklin remembers the 1994 bush fires

"Saturday January the 8th dawned, it was hot, it was still, and with that acrid scent of heavy ash in the air. The bay was obviously on the alert and everyone began preparing for the inevitable. Bushfire vehicles moved up and down the road, hoses were laid out, backpack extinguishers were filled and people, in or out of uniform, seem to appear from everywhere. Police boats cruised by with their loud-speakers warning us of the approaching threat, while overhead, helicopters with their monsoon buckets dipped down into the bay on their firestopping mission.

It was towards lunchtime, I remember standing out on the deck, when I felt a few drops of rain and we thought, Oh blessed it's come. But it was in actual fact it was it was condensation that preceded the fire...so it wasn't it wasn't a good omen as we thought. It was midday before we finally gathered our few suitcases, with a few possessions and mementos and my children's paintings, which I managed to strip from the walls, and we carried them down to the two wharves. Then we returned to make lunch, but it was too late. A fireball had come over the hill and the flames were racing down. I had wanted to stay and try and protect my property, but the police who'd been round in the early morning had given us very stern orders to evacuate, so there really was no time to argue or debate. I remember as we reached the wharf, hearing a wild roar, and turning round I saw the gum trees just keeling over sideways, before a 70 mile gale that always proceeds the fire. The wet towel wrapped round my neck flew off and trying to grasp it, I might too, have followed it into the water, had I not felt Jenny's grip tighten on me.

The boats were tugging at their moorings but we managed to get ourselves and the paintings into the boats and within minutes the choppy copper-coloured waters of the Bay were alive with boats of every description. Police boats, rescue boats, commuter boats, pleasure boats, barges and the Western Shore's Fire Brigade boat. So there was an amazing support and co-operation everywhere. It was a huge theatre of activity, and in amongst the flotilla of vessels I remember seeing two young boys in a canoe trying to rescue a stricken bird. There were so many acts of kindness, some generous donors of Church Point had delivered sandwiches to those on the wharf and when we were on the boat a barge came round with thirst-quenching water. Fortunately, I found a silver bowl in my bag, one of the last things that I grabbed as I was rushing out of the house so I could give Tom our labradoodle dog a drink. It could not have tasted any sweeter than our water from our plastic mug.

Meantime, the real drama was being played out behind a dense curtain of smoke that enveloped the southern slopes of Elvina Bay, being played out by a small and courageous band of fire people, residents and volunteers who confronting a wall of fire approaching them both on two fronts. From the boat you couldn't see the flames

except where they crept down a creek and started to lick the water line, nor could you see any of the houses. You just had to sit and wait and hope for over five hours. But the time didn't seem to have a relevance when you were out there It was not the past or the future you thought about, all that was important was the immediacy of the present, and you just had to hold on to the emotions in the pit of your stomach, while trying to find a bit of humour in the situation, even if at times, it was a little black humour.

It was after 6.30 that eve, that we took our two boats to Church Point to get some news, there we met the secretary of our local Fire Brigade who said that she'd just received news that we could return to the bay. What a strange feeling it was as we made our way up the pathways, strewn with leaves and broken branches and through the smoke see our house, solid and upright. It was just like coming out of a dream and I must admit that as I crossed the threshold, the feeling the deepest emotion that I had felt all day. We went up to the road, the boundary between our garden and the blackened landscape beyond, and found a small group of exhausted characters, charcoal-covered men. Nicola and I tried to thank them but in typical Aussie fashion it was just received with a pat on the shoulder and a shrug."

FROM PITTWATER TO SYDNEY

TRAVELLING IN 1788.

In .these days pf electric trams and motor cars, when one can travel from Plttwatcr-to Sydney In'an hour or so, It Is Interesting to i\)te the trials and dangers that attended such a Journey In 1788. Then, ot course, there were no roads as there are at nrceent. an A e-ho

conditions generally were altogether different but the description supplied by Captain Hunter of an excursion' made by a party from "tho settlement" Is none the less interesting. Captain Hunter writes:—

"In the morning of June 13, 1788, we Intended to land well up this branch (Pittwater), in order to avoid the most difficult and tiresome part of the road to Port Jackson. We embarked after we had breakfasted, and rowed up about a couple of miles, when the party for walking went on shore, each with his arms and knapsack containing two days' provisions. We were about half an hour in getting through the wood which led to the sea coast, where we fell Into our own and well-known path, and by 4 o'clock In the afternoon arrived at the north part of Port Jackson; but we might as well have 'been fifty leagues off, for here we could have no communication either with the Sirius or the settlement, and no boat had been ordered to meet us. We went Immediately to work and made a large fire, by which we lay all night, which happened to be very cold.

"The next day we crossed the hills and came to the mouth of the north-west harbor, but could not find the means of crossing It. **Muskets had been frequently fired during the night in** the hopes that some boat might have been down the harbor fishing, and heard them. We found this morning a canoe upon the beach, with which we had no doubt of getting two men across the water, who could In a short time walk over to the cove where the Sirius lay; but this prospect was disappointed by the first man who entered the canoe having overset her, and she Immediately sank, and he was obliged to swim ashore. After this we went to work to make a catamaran of the lightest wood we could find, but when finished and launched it would not bear the weight of one man.

"It was now proposed to walk round the head of the north-west harbor, which would have been a good long Journey for at least two days, and our provisions were nearly expended. To this proposal I was under the necessity of objecting for want of shoes, the last march having tore all but the soles from my feet, and they were tied on with spun-yarn. I therefore declined the proposed walk, and determined to go back to Broken Bay, and rejoin the boats. .We were Just upon the point of setting out when two of the people who were with us proposed swimming over the water and to cross through the wood to the Sirius. They immediately stripped, and each having had n dram they tied up in a handkerchief some clothes, which rested upon their shoulders. Thus equipped they took to the water, and in seven minutes landed on the opposite shore; but one, being seized with cramp, was obliged to disengage himself from his bundle, which was of course lost. They set off through the woods and a short time got on board the ship—the one with his shirt and trousers, the other perfectly naked. Upon, their information a boat was sent down and took tis on board, after a pretty fatiguing Journey." FROM PITTWATER TO SYDNEY (1910, December 6).
